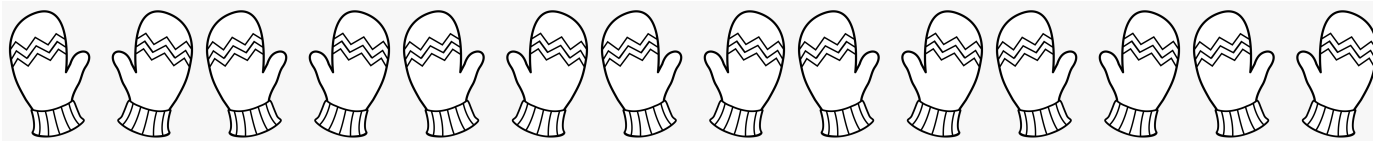


# ELKSTONE NEWSLETTER

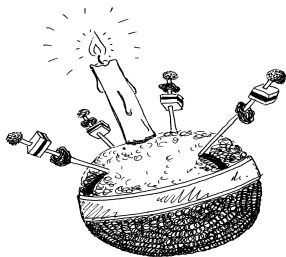

The walls and monuments create habitat for little creatures such as small mammals, reptiles and insects, as well as ferns, mosses and liverworts. And over 100 varieties of lichen can be found demonstrating the good air we have in our Village. The birds are plentiful and can be found feeding and enjoying the quality of the trees and berries. There are also bats.

Can you join us in the Churchyard from 10.00am on Saturday 11 January 2025 for a couple of hours to help tidy the ivy from the stone walls and clear any leaves still lying on the pathways, and generally help us maintain this place?

Robert Neal looks after our Churchyard, and we will follow his advice on how to care and maintain the churchyard to keep it beautiful and accessible to our whole community.

But six committee members and five villagers proved that the indomitable spirit of endurance burned, despite all the setbacks. Huddled in coats, electric torches illuminating notes, the financial report, the booking report and the maintenance report were received with enthusiasm so great that it was thought that the whole village should know how the committee was progressing. Hence this article. And the slight exaggeration!! Financially, under the careful and caring eye of Martyn, the Hall is holding steady, with enough in the funds to protect the building in case of a needed major repair and a gradual saving to allow for some improvements.

Thanks to Penny, bookings are good with new groups using the Hall and regular ones continuing. A villager using the Hall for a wider guest list can hire at a reduced rate. If a village event is planned, purely for villagers, no charge is made.

To aid cleaning, which is carried out so splendidly by Evie, and our thanks go to her, three new brooms and a long-handled ceiling brush have been purchased. To encourage hiring there is a new induction cooker, plus protective cover, a new fridge, wine cooler and water softener, new metal trays, pudding bowls and saucepans. A new floor and mats are being investigated and the kitchen will then be painted by Barbara. A door to protect the water softener will be made and the outside notice board renovated. Long-term expenditure will be aimed at money saving running costs and may include above-ceiling insulation and LED lighting. Cosmetic renovation will happen as money is available.

The meeting closed with heated mulled wine provided by Jeremy and the electricity engineers.

Ronnie is retiring from the Village Hall Committee after 26 years' service. He took part in the extension programme and the Millennium Celebrations as well as the more mundane, day-to-day business. ## **A417 Missing Link – Works Information**

**The Air Balloon roundabout will be closed overnight on the following dates:**

Wednesday 8 January to Wednesday 15 January 2025 (not including weekends)

Time: 21:00 to 06:00

We will be carrying out digging and surfacing activities, along with the removal of street lighting. These closures are necessary to ensure the safety of our workforce and to minimise disruption to drivers during periods of lighter traffic.

**An overnight closure between the Air Balloon roundabout and A429 Burford Road junction will take place on: Thursday 16 January to Friday 17 January 2025**

Time: 21:00 Thursday to 06:00 Friday

We will be carrying out work to connect to a water main.

Diversion routes will be in place, approved by Gloucestershire County Council.

## **‘Pedal Eazy’ by borrowing an e-bike**

The ‘Pedal Eazy’ project was agreed by the county council following a budget amendment put forward by the Green Party at a meeting earlier this year. The scheme is being run by the council’s Thinktravel team with the support of Gloucestershire Bike Project and Transition Stroud, and is open to anyone in the county. The main aim of the Pedal Eazy Loan Scheme is to give people the chance to borrow an e-bike for up to three months and see how it can transform their travel and daily lives. Anyone aged 18 and over can borrow an e-bike through the scheme. To check availability and make a booking, contact [Transition Stroud](#) or [Gloucestershire Bike Project](#).

E-bikes are hired on a monthly basis, with a maximum hire period of three months. It costs £70 per month for standard rental and £30 per month for jobseekers. If you decide to purchase a bike or accessories, all hire fees are refunded in the form of a bike voucher to encourage continued cycling. ## **Nature Notes**

### **RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch 24-26 January 2025**

Big Garden Birdwatch is the largest garden wildlife survey in the world, and you can be a part of it! Thousands of nature lovers will be counting birds from their gardens, balconies, parks and local green spaces over one weekend.

It’s fun, free and will only take an hour, whenever it suits you, from **Friday 24 – Sunday 26 January**.

#### **How to take part**

1. Get your free guide.
2. Spend an hour watching the birds in your patch, between 24-26 January, and record the birds that land.
3. Tell RSPB (even if that’s nothing at all)! You can submit your results online or by post.
